

SIP'N'SHOPS



We participated in both of the Chamber of Commerce's Sip and Shop events this year. On May 21st and September 17, we served wine and hors d'oeuvres in period costumes. It was a fun way to lure guests into the museum and we received some great donations! For those of you who asked, here's the recipe for the most popular snack of both evenings:

"Spicy Ritz Crackers" from the Frasiers

Preheat oven to 300 degrees.

Line 2 cookie sheets with parchment paper. Ingredients:

- 1 stick salted butter melted
- 2 tbls or 1 pkg Hidden Valley Ranch Mix (Dry)
- 1 tsp Garlic Powder
- 1 tbls Red Pepper flakes (or less to taste)
- 3 tubes Ritz Crackers

1/4-1/2 cup Grated Parmesan Cheese

In a large bowl mix butter, garlic powder, red pepper flakes and Hidden Valley Ranch mix. Stir to dissolve Ranch mix. Add in Ritz Crackers, toss to coat. Add Parmesan Cheese, toss to coat. Divide coated crackers onto cookie sheets and bake for 15 minutes. When cooled, divide if necessary.

Note: Betsy Schoebel Ladwig and Jeff Murphy were present but are not in this photo.




FUNdraisers






We worked hard this year— and had fun doing it!

Petrusky Family History — The First Three Generations in the U.S. 1876: From Poland to Wisconsin

Joan Guckenberger (nee Petruske) had written a wonderful book memorializing Princeton's Canadian Club. Now she has again donated copies of her most recent book to the public library and the historical society. Published in June 2022, the book relates the story of Michael and Catherine (Burchardt) Petrusky who immigrated from Poland in 1876 or 1877 with their two sons, John and Anton. John married Josephine Ronke, the youngest of fourteen children born to Andrew and Marianna Ronke. The family lived on a farm just outside of Princeton. HISTORIC PRINCETON NEWSPAPERS NOW ONLINE

We are very pleased to announce the completion of our historic newspaper digitization project! Our local newspapers dating from 1879 to 1993 are now available online for anyone to look at, putting historical and genealogical data within easy reach of the public. To see them, go https://archives.winnefox.org You can also go to the Princeton Public Library's website, princetonpublib.org, then click "Newspaper Archives." There will also be a link on our own website in the future.

Over the years, many people have come to us asking to see articles, obituaries, and photos, which we could not easily provide. Now we can. We know that one local author in particular, Roger Bartel, has relied almost exclusively on microfilm scans of these newspapers, which were difficult to access and impossible to search efficiently. Thanks to this process, he and others will have history's headlines at their fingertips.

Princeton had six newspapers over the years. The digitized scans include editions from:

- Green Lake County Democrat 1879-1885
- Princeton Republic 1867-1937
- Princeton Republic-Star 1905-1906
- Princeton Star 1902-1905
- Princeton Times 1935-1937
- Princeton Times-Republic 1937-1993



Users are able to search all of these at once, or only one, or whichever they choose. The newspapers can be easily searched by name, keyword, and date (or date range). A short instructional presentation about how to use the database will be given at the Princeton Public Library on Monday, December 12th at 1pm and again at 6pm. Attendees will be shown the best methods for searching, quirks of searching including OCI errors, and interesting articles and headlines.

To celebrate this achievement, anyone who wishes can request a free photocopy of a historic front page of the Princeton newspaper published on their birthday (or the closest date to it). Please contact the Princeton Public Library at ptplstaff@princetonpublib.org or 920-295-6777 to request your printout.

This project took over a year to complete, and cost about seventeen thousand dollars. 98,563 individual microfilm images had to be scanned, cleaned up, coded, uploaded to a library system server, and made searchable. This process involved the technical efforts of the Princeton Public Library staff, the Crowley Company of Frederick, Maryland, NMT Partners of Onalaska, Wisconsin, DC Johnson of Ripon, Wisconsin, and Keetra Baker of the Winnefox Library System.

The digitization was made possible with contributions from us, the Princeton Historical Society, the Princeton Public Library, the Caestecker (Green Lake) Library's Tom Gnewuch Memorial Fund, the Wisconsin Humanities Endowment, and the Winnefox Library System.

PHASE II MUSEUM CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY

We are so excited to be entering the next phase of our museum building's renovation! Plans have been drawn up, contractors consulted, and the work has begun. On October 15th, volunteers moved large piles of lumber out of the building in order to make space for our carpenters to work. Richard and Debbie May, owners of Whimsy Mountain and the former Handcraft building here in Princeton, have generously allowed us to store our supplies in their factory bays for the time being.

The back half of our museum is larger than the front half, and we hope that it will hold at least eleven permanent exhibits and at least one open area for rotating exhibits. To accomplish this, we will need to put in almost everything, including electricity, additional heating and cooling systems, and a partial floor. This huge endeavor has been made somewhat more doable by the generosity of an anonymous donor, who dedicated \$5,000 towards the project in memory of their spouse.

In the coming months, we will be seeking grants, donations, and volunteers to help us continue our work. Please consider sponsoring an exhibit or lending a hand!
