PHASE II MUSEUM PROGRESS

In April, we moved piles of lumber, furniture, and many large artifacts to local volunteer storage facilities to make way for our construction crews. Since that time, a huge amount of work has been going on non-stop.

Dedicated volunteers moved out debris, pulled down old ceiling tiles, built a floor over the old loading dock area, framed in the new exhibit spaces, laid wiring and insulation, installed doors and fixtures, and kept everything clean.

This immense undertaking would not have been possible without the help of over a dozen volunteers, dedicating hundreds of hours of labor. We thank them, and others, on the next page.

We have much left to do, including more insulation, drywall, a new ceiling, and of course, the actual history. Ten exhibits will go into this space: Schools, Churches, Community Service, Agriculture, Industry, Government, Arts & Entertainment, Disasters & Emergency Services, Communications, and Native American History & Nature. We are currently considering naming exhibits after sponsors. For example, "The Smith Family Agricultural Exhibit." Please contact us if this is of interest to you!



"What's Hot & What's Not" Our Antique Appraisal & Dinner Fundraiser

Our annual August dinner fundraiser was even bigger and better this year! We began the afternoon at 1pm by offering antique appraisals at the Folklore Museum for only \$5. Our volunteer appraisers were Matt Koski & Travis Nygard (Heffelfinger & Tweed appraising), and Kurt Smolek (Sasquatch's of Princeton). Together, their expertise covered antiques and collectibles from the 1790s to the 1990s.

Afterwards, we treated our guests to a marvelous barbeque dinner at Knickerbocker Landing. Attendees enjoyed chicken, pork, and beef, cornbread, coleslaw, and dessert. While they ate, they heard from professional auctioneer & appraiser Carol Miller of Bailey's Honor Auction Service. Ms. Miller spoke about "what's hot and what's not" in the antiques and collectibles market.

Over the course of the entire day, we held a silent auction. In addition to some wonderful baskets full of goodies, we auctioned off three large, stunning photo prints of historic Princeton scenes. Each of these were custom framed by Ron Hatfield, and came with detailed histories of the scenes in the photos.

73 people attended this event, and we raised \$2,375 for the Historical Society!

On November 13th, members of several local historical societies (Kingston, Berlin, Dartford and Princeton) met at Town Square in Green Lake. The group shared thoughts, ideas, and plans to work together for everyone's benefit. Attendees were afterwards taken on a tour of Green Lake County's former courthouse, built in 1896. Representing Princeton were Vickie Wielgosh and Chris & Jim Frasier.



From July 20th-23rd, our little city was bursting at the seams and booming with noise and fun! Thousands of people joined in the city celebrations, which included a children's parade, a huge grand parade, two rock concerts, carnival activities at City Park, a Kids Zone on Main Street, a fire show, water fights with the Princeton Fire Department, Voyageur canoe rides with Jerry Disterhaft and Glen Gorsuch, a yard decorating contest, a bagpiping performance, and innumerable sales, displays, and parties. Events were organized by the 175th Committee– Mary Lou Neubauer, Cheryle Nickel, Ron & Mary Hatfield, and Leanne Holland. Lee Williams, who passed away in May 2023, had also been a key part of the committee.

We did our part by keeping our Museums open extra days and extended hours, participating in the parades, and putting up extensive displays of photos and artifacts (see next page). We also hired local reporter DC Johnson as our official photographer of record for the event. Ms. Johnson took several thousand photos, which we will catalog and preserve. We hope to release many of these on our website and Facebook page as well. We have also kept many artifacts from the celebrations, including posters and souvenirs. Finally, we created a time capsule, and invited all Princeton area residents to contribute.

5 175th Display: Historic Photos







We worked with the Princeton Public Library to create a large display of historic photos and artifacts at the library. These were on display for about two months in July and August.



The 1948 Centennial edition of the Princeton Times-Republic newspaper published many historic photos, some of which we don't have. We would LOVE to scan these for our archives. The photos were contributed to the paper by the public, then returned to the owners. If you have one, or know someone who might, will you please get in touch? Send a message into the future! We want YOUR photos, videos, letters, and personal items!

Our goal is to create a snapshot of current-day Princeton, so people are encouraged to put in items that reflect their daily lives or the recent past. We have put in a copy of the Princeton Times-Republic covering the 175th Celebrations, a poster from the 175th celebrations, some movie tickets, magazines, grocery store advertisements, photos, and other ephemera. Some of the items we are putting in are digital content on a cell phone, and we welcome YOUR digital contributions too! Send us a TikTok, a voicemail, etc.

The time capsule itself is a large metal shipping box which once belonged to Lee Mevis, who attended college at UW Madison in the 1960s. His parents would fill the container with "care package" items any college student today would appreciate– food, clothes, money, and personal supplies. Unlike a cardboard box, the shipping container could be reused hundreds of times, for years. The cost for delivery (still stamped on the package) was only 60 cents.



Contribute YOUR memories to our time capsule! We have extended the deadline to bring things to us until May 2024. The time capsule will be opened in 25 years for Princeton's 200th birthday!


